

## **QLD University of Technology Studio Art Practice 2**





### **SUMMARY FOR BENCHMARKING**

### How well is interdisciplinary learning supported by the assessment design?

Well scaffolded, and balanced foundation level study providing an introduction to ID learning as well as learning of skills and approaches drawn from a variety of disciplines, within a relatively narrow disciplinary base (art), with increasing opportunity for self-direction and determination in preparation for following years of the qualification.

#### How well does the assessment design fit the ID cohort?

### Does it fit the level of student expertise?

Well-scaffolded for relatively large 1st year student cohort.

### Does it respond to the range and style of cohort learning expectations?

The project-focused approach is suitable for the selected, art-focused cohort.

### How well does the assessment design align to intended ID learning outcomes?

# Do the tasks and criteria sufficiently support development of students' disciplinary practices?

Deepen knowledge base and expand skills relevant to the art disciplines at an introductory level. Students are supported and directed to engage with particular practices and to compare the influence of these approaches on the content and ideas expressed.

### Do the tasks and criteria sufficiently support development of students' interdisciplinary skills?

20% of the unit/subject/course requires group work, allowing broad interdisciplinary skills to be somewhat developed.

### Do the student and staff roles influencing the direction / aims of the tasks support the ID learning outcomes?

Intentions of the outcomes are primarily student driven with staff agendas focusing mainly on the range and depth of engagement across the art disciplines presented.

### Do the student and staff roles influencing the process / development of the tasks support ID learning outcomes?

Balanced: some tasks are strongly directed by staff for development, and some elements of these offer scope for students to explore the implications of different approaches and applications.

### UNIT/SUBJECT/COURSE OUTLINE + OUTCOMES

This first year unit aims to continue the developing of strategies for practice in contemporary studio art as well as the cultivation of personal philosophies, to create an individual and self-sustaining artistic practice. It also aims to develop self-motivation, self-reliance and collaboration, as well as a sense of inquiry and openness to new ideas, media and studio experiences. All first year Art and Design students are enrolled across the board.

The unit content addresses the influence and significance of different media on content within contemporary artistic practice, thus providing catalysts for your own individual research and practice. In consultation with studio staff, you will work with a minimum of three different media including performance and screen-based work in your developing studio based practice. Lectures will support studio work by introducing professional practitioners, current art issues and practices and providing examples of contemporary art in a range of contrasting media and contexts. The unit content is constructed through the complex interaction of idea generation, material modes and their production in such a way to as encourage the development of your ability to communicate effectively.

### **Learning Outcomes:**

- Apply a basic vocabulary of terms relevant to materials and forms in the Visual Arts;
- Exercise skills and knowledge of basic materials and forms in Visual Arts;
- Apply creative processes of repetition and revision in response to problems presented in the Visual Arts studio;
- Practice Visual Arts independently and group situations.

### Rationale

Consequently, this unit introduces aspects of artistic practice that will actively support self-motivation, self-reliance, as well as a sense of inquiry and openness to new ideas and experiences. It therefore comes in the first year of your course and provides foundational learning for future studio practice. As an active contributor in the cultural and creative industries, it is important that you learn to formulate personal conceptual and visual interests, as well as develop an understanding of your individual body of art work that is based on the application of knowledge of contemporary visual arts practices. It is an important concern of this unit that you understand that the media employed in visual art are not neutral but actively contribute to the form and content of work produced.

#### Aim

This unit aims to continue the developing of strategies for practice in contemporary studio art as well as the culitvation of personal philosophies, to create an individual and self-sustaining artistic practice. It also aims to develop self-motivation, self-reliance and collaboration, as well as a sense of inquiry and openness to new ideas, media and studio experiences.
